‘**22.(1)** The chief executive must give a person a security interest certificate for a vehicle if the person— 7

(a) asks the chief executive, in the approved form, for the certificate; and 9

(b) pays the fee prescribed under the regulations. 11

‘(2) A security interest certificate for a motor vehicle must— 12

(a) if security interests are registered for the vehicle—state particulars about the security interests; and 13
14

(b) if no security interest is registered for the vehicle—state that fact. 15

‘(3) The certificate must also state— 16

(a) the day and time it is issued; and 17

(b) other particulars the chief executive considers appropriate. 18

‘(4) The chief executive may issue the certificate in the way the chief executive considers appropriate. 19

Example of the way the certificate may be issued— 21

The chief executive may issue the certificate by electronic means from the department’s computer to a motor dealer’s computer and printed by the dealer’s printer. 22

‘(5) The time of issue stated in the certificate must be expressed as the relevant time in New South Wales. 25
