An Act to amend the *WorkCover Queensland Act 1996*, and for other purposes

The Parliament of Queensland enacts—

Clause **1.** This Act may be cited as the *WorkCover Queensland Amendment Act 1999*.

WorkCover Queensland Amendment

- (a) for compensation and damages for the total of the accrued, continuing, future and contingent liabilities for all injuries sustained by the self-insurer’s workers that arise from events starting or happening during the period of the self-insurer’s licence (“**residual liability**”); and
- (b) for the following (“**outstanding liability**”)—
- (i) compensation for the total of the accrued, continuing, future and contingent liabilities for all injuries that arise from events starting or happening before the issue of the self-insurer’s licence sustained by the self-insurer’s workers employed at the time the entitlement under section 168⁵ arises;
- (ii) damages for injuries to the self-insurer’s workers arising from events starting or happening before the issue of the self-insurer’s licence.

‘(2) WorkCover must pay a self-insurer an amount for the self-insurer’s outstanding liability that is calculated under a regulation by an actuary appointed by WorkCover.’.
