Health Legislation (Ratios and Other Matters) Amendment Regulation 2024

Human Rights Certificate

Prepared in accordance with Part 3 of the Human Rights Act 2019

In accordance with section 41 of the *Human Rights Act 2019*, I, the Honourable Shannon Fentiman MP, Minister for Health, Mental Health and Ambulance Services and Minister for Women provide this human rights certificate with respect to the *Health Legislation (Ratios and Other Matters) Amendment Regulation 2024* (Amendment Regulation).

In my opinion, the Amendment Regulation, as tabled in the Legislative Assembly, is compatible with the human rights protected by the *Human Rights Act 2019*. I base my opinion on the reasons outlined in this statement.

Overview of the Subordinate Legislation

The purpose of the Amendment Regulation is to amend the *Hospital and Health Boards Regulation 2023* and *Medicines and Poisons (Medicines) Regulation 2021*.

Amendments to the Hospital and Health Boards Regulation and Medicines and Poisons (Medicines) Regulation support the changes made by the *Health and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2024* (Amendment Act) which received Royal Assent on 18 March 2024.

The Amendment Act:

- amended section 138B of the *Hospital and Health Boards Act 2011* to clarify that for the purposes of nurse-to-patient and midwife-to-patient ratios, a newborn baby is counted as a patient when they are staying in a room on a maternity ward with their birthing parent; and
- inserts a new section 6A in the *Termination of Pregnancy Act 2018* to allow additional registered health practitioners to perform a medical termination of pregnancy to the extent they are authorised to do so under the *Medicines and Poisons Act 2019* and instruments made under that Act.

The Health Legislation (Ratios and Other Matters) Amendment Regulation 2024 (Amendment Regulation) amends the:

- *Hospital and Health Boards Regulation 2023* to prescribe a minimum midwife-to-patient ratio and the maternity wards the ratio will apply to; and
- *Medicines and Poisons (Medicines) Regulation 2021* to update references to the new versions of the Midwives and Registered Nurses Extended Practice Authorities (EPAs) to allow registered nurses and midwives to perform medical terminations of pregnancy.

Human Rights Issues

Human rights relevant to the subordinate legislation (part 2, division 2 and 3 of the Human Rights Act)

The Amendment Act engages and limits human rights. The statement of compatibility that accompanied the Amendment Act details how the provisions of that Act are reasonable and demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society based on human dignity, equality and freedom under section 13 of the Human Rights Act.

Amendments to the Hospital and Health Boards Regulation

The amendments to the Hospital and Health Boards Regulation do not limit human rights.

Amendments to the Medicines and Poisons (Medicines) Regulation

The amendments to the Medicines and Poisons (Medicines) Regulation do not limit human rights.

Conclusion

I consider that the *Health Legislation (Ratios and Other Matters) Amendment Regulation 2024* is compatible with the *Human Rights Act 2019* because it does not limit human rights.
