Proclamation No. 2 – Casino Control and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2022

Human Rights Certificate

In accordance with section 41 of the *Human Rights Act 2019* (Human Rights Act), I, Yvette D'Ath MP, Attorney-General and Minister for Justice and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence provide this human rights certificate with respect to the *Proclamation – Casino Control and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2022* (Proclamation) made under the *Casino Control and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2022* (Amendment Act).

In my opinion, the Proclamation, as tabled in the Legislative Assembly, is compatible with the human rights protected by the Human Rights Act. I base my opinion on the reasons outlined in this statement.

Overview of the Subordinate Legislation

The Amendment Act, which received assent on 21 October 2022, contains amendments to the Wagering Act 1998 (Wagering Act) to provide the State's exclusive sports wagering licensee under that Act with the ability to conduct wagering on approved simulated sport and racing events and contingencies (virtual event wagering) and to provide a framework for Government consideration and approval of virtual event wagering and for the evaluation and approval of the equipment generating the virtual events. Section 2(c) of the Amendment Act provides that the provisions relating to virtual event wagering are to commence on a day to be fixed by proclamation.

Human Rights Issues

Human rights relevant to the subordinate legislation (Part 2, Division 2 and 3 *Human Rights Act 2019*)

The Proclamation does not affect or engage a human right as it is machinery in nature.

Conclusion

I consider that the Proclamation is compatible with the Human Rights Act because it does not raise a human rights issue.
